Since 2016, we have grown Essex Police by 905 police officers. This has led to a 72% reduction in anti-social behaviour (ASB) and we have halved homicide and burglary since I first took office.

This year has been the most challenging budget round I have yet experienced. The proposed Government policing settlement fell short, and we fought for and secured an additional £2.3m in national funding. While this has gone some way to bridge Essex Police's £5.3m budget shortfall, we have had to make the tough decision to reduce police staff, police officer allowances and halt all non-essential building and technology projects.

Although we have made over £8m in efficiency savings in Essex Police, the shortfall in funding has meant an increase in the Essex Police Precept by 5.7% equivalent to £13.95 a year (27p a week) for a band D property. This will allow us to maintain officer and PCSO strength, to continue getting crime down and creating more visible neighbourhood policing.

Essex County Fire and Rescue Service is continuing to grow the prevention and protection activity it carries out, including the number of home safety checks for vulnerable people.

Tough choices have also been made for the Essex County Fire and Rescue Service precept following the loss of the Services Grant and Funding Guarantee for 2025/26.


